

Palestinian Prisoner's Day 2021

The Context

Every year, Israel detains and imprisons thousands of Palestinians, including women and children. This is done through frequent night raids of Palestinian cities, towns, villages and refugee camps by Israeli occupation forces. All Palestinian detainees are tried in military courts, which have a 99% conviction rate.

Since the beginning of the Israeli occupation in 1967, Israel has imprisoned over 1 million Palestinians. Today, there are 4,500 Palestinians held in Israeli prisons. 440 Palestinians are held under "Administrative detention", or imprisonment without charge or trial. Since 1967, Israel has issued at least 60,000 administrative detention orders.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, Israel conducted 3,425 military search and arrest raids into the occupied West Bank during the year 2020, imprisoning more than 4,600 Palestinians. 1,114 administrative orders were also issued during the same year.

Almost all Palestinians detainees, including women and children, are subject to torture and ill-treatment. Additionally, around 550 Palestinians imprisoned suffer from chronic illnesses.







Torture

Israel has **no specific legislation outlawing torture**. In 1999, the Israeli "Supreme Court" ruled against torture but provided legal cover for Israeli interrogators to use different types of pressure amounting to torture and illtreatment against Palestinian political detainees in so-called "ticking bomb" cases. However, Israeli interrogators still exercise torture with full impunity and zero accountability.

The Israeli legal system is **fully complicit** in allowing this flagrant violation of human rights. This complicity became fully evident in 2017, when the "Supreme Court" exempted alleged torturers from investigation and prosecution, prompting the UN Special Rapporteur on Torture to condemn the ruling as it provided a "license to torture".

Since 1967, one third of Palestinian detainees who died in Israeli custody were killed by torture. According to Amnesty International, four Palestinians died while in Israeli custody from torture or other ill-treatment in 2019.

These are some of the torture and ill-treatment techniques employed by Israel: physical assault, solitary confinement, verbal abuse, stress positions, prolonged isolation from the outside world, inhumane detention conditions, excessive use of blindfolds and handcuffs, sleep deprivation, deliberate medical negligence, denial of food and water for extended periods, denial of access to toilets, denial of access to showers or change of clothes for days or weeks.

Women

As of today, 41 Palestinian women are imprisoned by Israel, including 11 mothers. The methods of torture and ill-treatment used against female Palestinian detainees cause severe physical and mental suffering. They endure verbal abuse, sexual harassment, denial of sanitary products and being forced into stress positions. Female detainees also report being subjected to sexually degrading insults as well as threats of rape, including against family members.

Israeli prison authorities also employ **strip searches** and intrusive body searches against Palestinian female prisoners. This measure is mostly used during transfer of Palestinian female prisoners from prisons to the military courts or as a form of punishment.





Children

Israel is the only country in the world that has a military juvenile court system, exclusively for Palestinian children as young as 12 years of age. Israel detains an average of 700 Palestinian children yearly. Today, 168 children are in Israeli prisons, **27** of them are placed in **solitary confinement**.

The torture of Palestinian child detainees begins the moment they are detained. The majority of children are detained during night home raids. These raids instill fear and terrorize the children and their families, who are not informed where their children are being taken.

Most children are denied the right to counsel or presence of parents during interrogation. Around 85% of detained children report being physically and verbally abused.

International law

Torture is **strictly prohibited** under international law. The prohibition of torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment is affirmed in several international conventions and declarations, including the Geneva Conventions, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, and the United Nations Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment. When the use of torture is widespread and systematic, it is regarded as a **crime against humanity** under the Rome Statute.

International law **obliges Israel**, as an occupying power, to provide allowances for Palestinian detainees, as enshrined in **Articles 98** and **81** of the **Fourth Geneva Convention**. It also ensures that **support** should be provided for the **dependents** on the detainees.

The majority of detainees are the sole financial providers for their families, which means that Israel is required to provide for their dependents. Israel does not honor all these obligations. Instead, Israel is punishing the Palestinian government for providing allowances to the families of Palestinian prisoners by pirating Palestinian tax revenues.
